Meet...The FoodInResidence Team

FoodInResidence (FIR) plays an integral part in the student experience within the University, working alongside the core Residences support services. The FIR catering teams operate within a multi hall site setup, covering both Victoria Park and Fallowfield. This currently consists of nine Halls, all with varying demographics including self service; family service; five day a week and seven day a week operations. These areas deliver an innovative, modern five week menu cycle, promoting freshly prepared, nutritious products, with an emphasis on quality, variety and choice

This is all executed within hall student populations, varying from 100 up to 350, culminating in an ultimate service delivery of over half a million breakfasts and evening meals, both prepared and served by the team, within the student academic year. This activity is all sense checked by a customer feedback Facebook medium, known as 'Rants, Raves & Craves', which gives the team an opportunity to continually improve the business.

The entire catering experience is enhanced with the provision of formal evening meals, scheduled at the start of the academic year, providing a three to five course culinary plated served dinner experience. There are also special days in the annual calendar, including themed evenings, which include traditional Christmas meals and parties.

Outside of this activity, within vacation time, the team are kept busy delivering hospitality catering services to our conference clients, utilising the halls for meetings and events.

The team also operate a busy retail catering outlet, Source Cafe which is located adjacent to Owens Park reception. This provides a state of the art hub and meeting point for students. Serving a variety of beverages, grab and go items and eat in products, the outlet is open for the students 7 days a week and until 9pm on most weekdays.

All of this could not happen without the continued commitment of all the people carrying out key roles within the FIR business, which includes: the dedicated catering managers; chefs; front of house teams; and Kitchen Porters, who all make it happen every day, day in day out!

The entire FIR team also deliver a robust sustainability policy daily to their students. One of the fundamental partnerships recently formed with the Kindling Trust epitomises our ongoing vision and adds tremendous value to the culinary experience and promotes awareness to the student.

Utilising the 'Manchester Veg People' programme, this organisation provides produce to all our student halls on a daily basis, with fresh organic vegetables from local growers in the North West, which are within a 40 mile radius of the University. This joint venture, along with a number of key initiatives, has contributed highly to our recent attainment of the Soil Association – Bronze Catering Mark. The catering team now have our sights firmly on the achievement of silver accreditation in the near future.

In the pursuit for continued customer satisfaction and to ensure we maximise the student experience



within catered halls, the FIR team embarked on a 'Surprise & Delight', chef's theatre campaign in the spring of 2013. The scheduled programme recommenced in October 2013.

It is a complete pleasure and ultimate

honour to lead such a wonderful team of people, all striving for the same goal - 100% Customer Satisfaction.

Update on Capital Projects



Simon Building – New Lecture Theatres

Three new lecture theatres within the Simon building were successfully handed over at the end of October. The theatres have been formed in the old basement areas and presented some real challenges to the team. Work will continue on the escape staircase and other Simon Building improvement works including new spaces for UMSA and Wellbeing, and the creation of new small teaching rooms.

A V Hill 5th Floor Refurbishment

The refurbishment project to fit out the shelled space on the 5th floor of the A V Hill Building to provide additional lab and offices; and the provision of additional office space and write-up areas on floors 1 to 4 within the building was completed on 22nd November 2013.

Manchester Meeting Place

Manchester Meeting Place is the new name for the University's well-established Staff House Conference Centre (on North Campus).

This great city centre meeting venue has just completed the final phase of its meeting rooms refurbishment with new furnishings and upgraded AV equipment. Following the refurbishment the University wanted to give the building a new name to reflect its main purpose of being a venue that brings people together to hold meetings and events as well as demonstrating the University's commitment to delivering what is expected of a great meeting place in Manchester.

The meeting rooms, which range in capacity from 20 to 90 theatre style, benefit from free wifi access and plentiful natural daylight and we have a professional in-house team to ensure every aspect of an event runs smoothly. All organisers now receive free parking right outside the venue, a dedicated refreshment lounge has also been created called The Hub where delegates can enjoy fresh fruit as well as biscuits at their breaks, and if organisers want to push the boat out we can also upgrade our packages to include breakfast rolls, smoothies or ice cream! The Mumford restaurant on the first floor has relaunched its lunchtime menu to include a choice of hot and cold dishes and desserts.

Food outlets across campus will be visited by a number of mystery visitors in order to meet strategic aims and objectives and to evaluate customer service across all the staff /student food outlets. Questions for the mystery shopper cover a number of key aspects of customer service with measureable outcomes, so that teams can take an objective look at customer service processes. Shoppers also complete an assessment form during the visit to the outlet.

This project will highlight any areas where training is required for individuals and teams. The April visits were a great success and already we've seen service levels have improved. Each time the process takes place the teams identify examples of best practice, which is then mirrored across other areas.

The teams are also working hard at improving customer and staff relationships alongside receiving rewards and encouragement for excellent performance. We've a commitment to 'surprising and delighting' our customers, continuously adding value to the customer service experience, improving customer loyalty.

A number of the operational team will work with Chris Lowe, Shopper Anonymous, who will train our teams to disseminate feedback in the most beneficial way alongside advice on implementing positive change. Colleagues will identify key objectives of the business to focus on then we can ensure these objectives are met. Chris Lowe, Shopper Anonymous said: 'The training is aimed at helping the whole team understand why delivering exceptional customer service is important to them personally. Denmark Road Building: Centenary Year



The Denmark Road Building, which is home to the Maintenance Services Unit, celebrates its centenary this year, and was once the home of The Rivoli Picture House.

The Rivoli Picture House opened in 1914. It had 1,100 seats, a stage and three dressing rooms for the performances which were held there. The foyer had a lovely carpet and polished brass and was always full of adverts for forthcoming attractions.



As you entered the picture house there was an old lady who sat just inside the entrance. You gave her your ticket and she tore it in two, gave half back to you and threaded the stub on a needle and thread.

During the war it was frequented by American soldiers, whose supply of sweets, chocolate and chewing gum, made youngsters trips to the Rivoli all the more enjoyable.

The location close to the University with its hundreds of students ensured the Rivoli soon became a popular venue. For a brief period in the 1920's it became a dance hall, reverting to being a picture house again in 1929.



The Rivoli survived as a picture house until the early 1960's when, in common with much of the area, it was among a number of properties transferred to the University, closing on 5th March 1960.

Other appliances besides PCs and laptops continue to use energy when they are plugged in and switched on at the wall socket, including:

- Phone, tablets, battery chargers
- Kitchen equipment (kettles, coffee makers, dishwashers, microwaves)
- Water coolers
- Boilers, (portable) heaters, air cons and extract fans
- Laboratory equipment (ONLY BY APPROVED LABORATORY TECHNICIANS)

PLEASE DO NOT TURN OFF (if you are not sure, seek further advice):

- Fax machines
- Fridges/freezers (unless empty)
- Experiments
- Servers
- Safety/monitoring equipment
